Researching Virginia

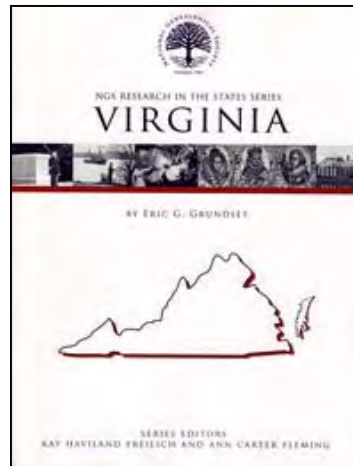
The founding of Virginia dates to the first permanent English settlement at Jamestown in 1607. Many other English settlers arrived soon thereafter, followed by African-Americans beginning in 1619. Although a few German glassmakers and house builders were recruited to work by the Virginia Company of London in 1608, more came later as indentured servants from Siegen to present-day Orange County. In 1717, an additional 100 indentured servants from Baden-Württemberg settled in Spotsylvania County, and a smaller group settled in 1721 at the Little Fork in Culpepper County. The first Huguenots (French Protestants) arrived in Virginia in 1620, although the majority arrived in 1700-01.

Virginia originally included all of the area that now makes up Virginia, West Virginia (which broke away from Virginia in 1863), and Kentucky. Present-day Virginia has 95 counties, the most recently-created being Dickenson, formed from Buchanan and Wise Counties in 1880. Virginia also has 39 independent cities, such as St. Louis is an independent city in Missouri.

The Special Collections Department has more than 1200 books for Virginia genealogical research, as well as a collection of original records on microfilm. [A guide to Virginia sources](http://tinyurl.com/lecwwfz) <<http://tinyurl.com/lecwwfz>> in the department can be downloaded from the library's website. The following highlights a few of the items available for Virginia research.

A good general guide for Virginia research is "Virginia Genealogy: Sources & Resources" by Carol McGinnis (R 975.5 M145V and circulating copy) one of the most compre-

hensive handbooks available. Although at twenty years old, it includes no internet references, it nevertheless will give you an excellent overview of Virginia's land, people and history, a thorough analysis of the state and county records and a discussion of resources for African-American research. An extensive bibliography will lead to other research possibilities.



A second and more up-to-date, albeit much shorter, guide is "Research in Virginia," 2nd ed., by Eric G. Grundset (R 975.5 G889R and circulating copy), National Genealogical Society Special Publication Number 83 of the Research in the States Series. It covers all the topics mentioned above but in a little under fifty pages.

Since Virginia is one of the oldest U.S. states, many books have already been written about its founding families. Be sure to look in the almost 3500 pages of the three-volume set, "Adventurers of Purse and Person: Virginia, 1607-1624/25," 4th edition (R 975.5 A244; circulating copies are available for volumes 1 and 3) for very early ancestors. Also of special interest are the three sets of "Genealogies of Virginia Families," (R 975.5G 326 and circulating copies) featuring articles culled from the Virginia Magazine of History and Biography (five volumes and almost 5000 pages), Tyler's Quarterly Historical and Genealogical



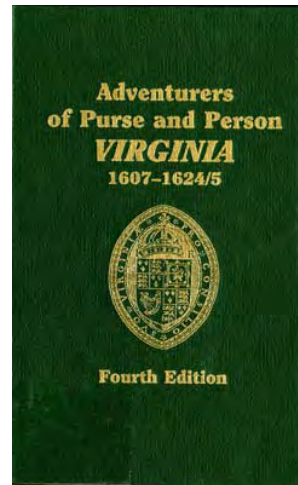

Magazine (four volumes and almost 3700 pages) and the William and Mary College Quarterly Magazine (five volumes and almost 5000 pages). In addition to genealogies, the Tyler's series includes selected family documents, such as wills and Bible records. The William and Mary series also contains Bible records.

If you are searching for early marriage records, consult "Virginia Marriages, Early to 1800: A Research Tool" (R 975.5 V817) or "Virginia Marriage Records from the Virginia Magazine of History and Biography, the William and Mary College Quarterly, and Tyler's Quarterly" (R 975.5 V817 and circulating copy). Early birth and death records are scattered, but the Special Collections Department has sources for selected times and places.

Early wills have been abstracted in "Virginia Will Records from the Virginia Magazine of History and Biography, the William and Mary College Quarterly, and Tyler's Quarterly" (R 975.5 V817 and circulating copy). Wills

commonly include the names of a spouse, children, and oftentimes, children's spouses and grandchildren. Wills also give you an idea of the relative wealth of your ancestor.



Federal census records can be researched in the Ancestry Library Edition database, available for use at all St. Louis County Library branches. Unfortunately, the 1790 and 1800 federal censuses for Virginia no longer exist. Other sources can help fill the gap, however, such as the two-volume set, "1787 Census of Virginia" (975.5 S378S) and "Virginia Tax Records from the

Virginia Magazine of History and Biography, the William and Mary College Quarterly, and Tyler's Quarterly" (R 975.5 V817 and circulating copy).

Written histories are useful for giving context to an ancestor's life and providing a frame of reference while doing research. The six-volume "History of Virginia" (Q 975.5 H673) is useful for this purpose. The first three volumes, consisting of more than 1300 pages, cover the history of the state through World War I. Volumes 4 through 6 – almost 2000 pages – include biographies of doctors, bankers, lawyers, preachers, postmasters and even farmers.

Was your ancestor a member of a religious congregation? Did he or she have a Bible? "A Guide to Church Records in the Archives Branch, Virginia State Library" (Q 975.5 V817G) identifies more than 300 records from Baptist, Catholic, Christian (Disciples of Christ), Episcopal, Quaker, Lutheran, German Reformed, Methodist, Presbyterian, and Unitarian Universalist churches, as well as Jewish temples. "A Guide to Bible Records in the Archives Branch, Virginia State Library" (Q 975.5 V817G) lists and briefly describes more than 3500 family Bibles.

As mentioned above, many early settlers were from Germany and France, as well as England. For German ancestral research, see the "Virginia Germans" by Klaus

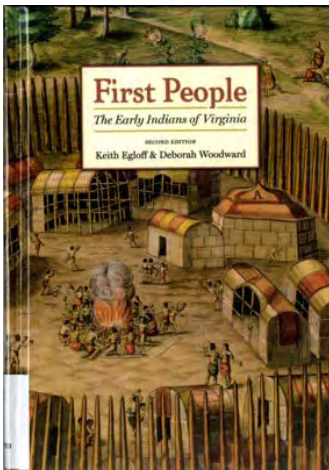

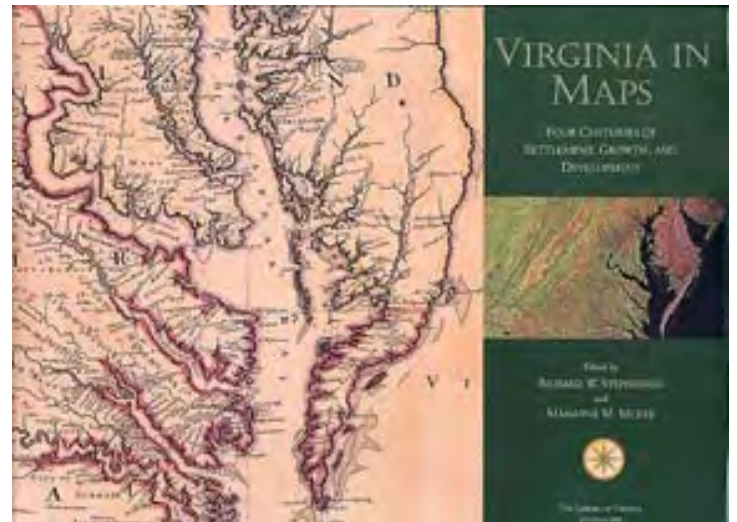
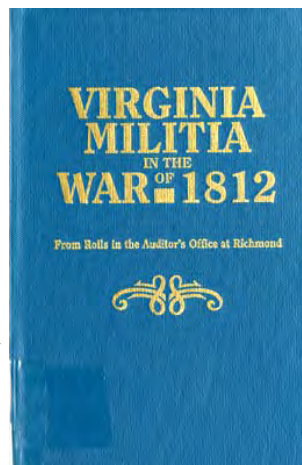
French Huguenots settling in Virginia are discussed in “Documents, Chiefly Unpublished, Relating to the Huguenot Emigration to Virginia and to the Settlement at Manakin-Town...” by R. A. Brock (975.5 B864D).



For African-American research, the five-volume “Virginia Slave Births Index, 1853-1865” (R 975.5 V817) is an invaluable resource for researching pre-Emancipation African-American ancestors. See also the two-volume set, “Free African Americans of

North Carolina, Virginia and South Carolina from the Colonial Period to about 1820” (R 975.5 H4678F and circulating copies) for African American ancestors who were free long before Emancipation. For researchers of Native American ancestry from Virginia, consult “First People: The Early Indians of Virginia” (R 975.5 E31F).

In order to locate where your Virginia ancestor lived, a gazetteer such as a “Gazetteer of Virginia and West Virginia” (R 975.5 G198G and circulating copy) is a valuable aid. It lists all cities, towns, villages, post offices, mountains, valleys, rivers and creeks that existed in Virginia and West Virginia at the time of its publication in 1904. Another help is “Virginia Atlas and Gazetteer” (R 912.755 D362V), which shows every place imaginable in map form. Did you have an ancestor who lived in Augusta County in 1765 who shows up in Botetourt County in 1775? He may not have moved at all. Botetourt County was carved out of



Augusta County in 1770. See “Atlas of County Boundary Changes in Virginia, 1634-1895” (R 975.5 D693A and circulating copy) for details. “Virginia in Maps: Four Centuries of Settlement, Growth, and Development” (R 975.5 S837V) traces the development of the state through 187 annotated maps. Was the land on which your early Virginia ancestor lived a patent or grant? Check the eight-volume set, “Cavaliers and Pioneers: Abstracts of Virginia Land Patents and Grants,” covering 1623-1782 (R 975.5 N997C and circulating copies).

Many resources are available for Virginia military history. An example of an excellent source for Revolutionary War information is the six-volume “Virginia / West Virginia Genealogical Data from Revolutionary War Pension and Bounty Land Warrant Records” (975.5 W265V) and for the War of 1812, the two-volume “Virginia Militia in the War of 1812” (975.5 V817).

The Special Collections Department has original wills, deeds, marriage records, land grants, and other records available on microfilm for various Virginia Counties. [A list and finding aid](http://tinyurl.com/luat8om) <<http://tinyurl.com/luat8om>> is available on the library’s website. The department’s collection includes hundreds of books with record indexes and abstracts and published histories covering specific counties. Check the [library catalog](http://webpac.slcl.org) <webpac.slcl.org> to find out what is available for your county of interest.

YESTERDAY'S NEWS

All About a Death Certificate

Disputes between the Coroner and the Health Department relative to the legitimate duties of the respective departments are of almost daily occurrence, the latest instance of the kind occurring yesterday. It appears that a 10-months-old child of Henry Knox, colored, died at No. 1026 North

Seventh Street, without medical attention. Knox applied for a burial certificate, and when asked for the name of the physician who attended the child, he stated that no one had attended it. Dr. Leuedeking, Clerk of the Board of Health, then declined to issue a certificate and referred him to the Coroner and was sent back to the Board of Health. Dr. Luedeking then wrote a caustic letter to the Coroner, stating that the Board of Health was not empowered to hold inquests, and as the present case was one where an inquest should be held, he would decline to issue a certificate until one was held. The Coroner has not been heard from in reply. In the meantime the dead child is above ground. (St. Louis Globe-Democrat, 2 November 1881, page 9)

Runaway Horse

A horse attached to a sewing machine wagon ran away yesterday, throw[ing] sewing machines, clocks, wringers, etc., in every direction, and frightening a number of school children. The wagon was but slightly damaged, but its contents are fit subjects for repair shops. (St. Louis County Watchman-Advocate, Sept. 10, 1886)

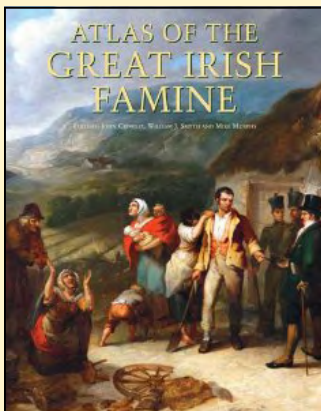

Atlas of the Great Irish Famine

New York University Press,

Between 1845-1852, more than one million people died and well over a million others fled Ireland. The authors seek to understand how such peace-time decimation could occur in in-

dustrialized, 19th-century Europe. More than 200 original maps provide detailed analysis of population devastation. Other sources, including written and oral accounts, historical documents, contemporary art, and photography illustrate the events as they took place and to describe the modern results of this tragedy. The publication also considers relief efforts, including the operation of the Poor Law and the creation of the workhouse system, within the overall political landscape. Patterns of emigration and the modern Irish Diaspora are also discussed. With dozens of contributors, this thoroughly researched book is a sober reminder of the most pivotal event in modern Irish history.
