■ **The Special Collections Department** recently acquired the 22-roll microfilm set of *St. Louis [City], Missouri Probate Court Guardianship Case Files, 1802-1875*. Files generally include an application for guardianship, affidavits, inventories, bonds, legal notices from newspapers, bills of sale, receipts, etc. Roll 1 consists of an alphabetical surname index, which points to the case number needed. Case numbers are missing until Roll 12, but a print index is kept at the Special Collections Reference Desk. The Department staff is working on a more workable index.

■ **The National Archives** recently announced that it has opened more than 300,000 case files on alien residents in the U.S. who were born 1909 or before. The files, known as “A-Files,” can include photographs, personal correspondence, birth certificates, health records, visas, applications and other documents. ■ **iArchives has sold its Footnote.com database to Ancestry.com** for \$27 million dollars in cash, stocks and assumption of liabilities, according to a GlobeNewswire report released on 23 Sept. Among other benefits, Ancestry.com will gain access to iArchives image viewing technology and document digitization capabilities. More about St. Louis cemeteries

A year ago this column featured cemetery records and research in the Special Collections Department (see the [October 2009 issue of PastPorts](http://www.slcl.org/pastports/2009/10.pdf) <<http://www.slcl.org/pastports/2009/10.pdf>>, page 2). October, with the approach of Halloween and religious holidays honoring and remembering the dead, seems the perfect time to revisit the subject and add a few new titles to the mix.

For those interested in influential personalities buried in St. Louis cemeteries, Carol Ferring Shepley’s book, *Movers and Shakers, Scalawags and Suffragettes: Tales from Bellefontaine Cemetery* (St. Louis: Missouri History Museum, 2008; R 977.866 S548M) will be a good read. The author provides brief biographical sketches of many prominent (and some infamous) individuals buried in

Bellefontaine, including those who designed its grounds and much of its funerary architecture. An older title along the same lines is Kevin Amsler's *Final Resting Place: The Lives and Deaths of Famous St. Louisans* (St. Louis: Virginia Publishing Co., 1997; R 977.866 A528F), which discusses the lives of notable St. Louisans buried in a number of local cemeteries and some in other localities.

Tombstone Talks: Landmarks Tour of Calvary Cemetery (St. Louis Landmarks Association, 1970; R 977.866 L257T) offers concise information about persons influential in early St. Louis History who were originally buried in older Catholic cemeteries located in the present downtown area. On a more obscure note, *What a Grave Undertaking* by Keith Rawlings (Kirkwood, Mo.: Youth in Action, 2005; R 977.865 R269W), covers Quinette Cemetery, a little-known 19th century African American burial ground that was saved from obliteration by development. Besides a list of interments, the book features stories of families whose members are buried in the cemetery and chapters discussing efforts to restore the grounds and honor those buried there.

Those who would like to know more about the history of St. Louis cemeteries proper will find several books in the collection. Ann Morris's *Sacred Green Space: A Survey of Cemeteries in St. Louis County* (St. Louis: Ann Morris, 2000; R 977.865 M875S), mentioned in the Oct. 2009 *PastPorts* article, still provides a good overview and guide. Esley Hamilton, a notable local historian and architectural expert, includes the histories of several prominent Jewish cemeteries in *The Cemeteries of University City* (University City, Mo.: Historical Society of University City, 1998; R977.865 H217C). *St. Peter's Cemetery History* by Shirley Wotawa (St. Louis: Shirley Wotawa, 2004; R 977.865 W936S and circulating copy) is a detailed historical investigation of a local cemetery important to the German Protestant Community. Besides the current cemetery, the author also discusses its predecessor, the Lemp Avenue German Evangelical Cemetery (sometimes referred to as Westermann's Cemetery), located near Lemp and Cherokee in St. Louis City. Bethany Cemetery, established by Bethany German Evangelical Church and later acquired by St. Peter's, is also included. As a bonus, Wotawa adds brief histories of families who attended St. Peter's Church and whose members now rest in the cemetery.

Family historians, of course, are interested in the genealogical data cemeteries can provide. For this purpose, cemetery indexes are crucial, and *St. Louis Burials, Vols. 1*

and 2 on CD-ROM, produced by the St. Louis Genealogical Society (StLGS), are indispensable for St. Louis research. StLGS's recently released *St. Louis Burials, Vol. 3* providing access to burial information for 21 additional cemeteries, including Bellefontaine, Memorial Park, Washington Park, and many important sectarian burial grounds. *St. Louis Burials, Vols. 1 and 2* are available on public computers in the Special Collections Department. Vol. 3. is available by inquiring at the Special Collections Department reference desk. TIPS

■ **Retrieving a document printed from the Footnote database:** Using the print function within the Footnote database results in a printout with a URL just below the Footnote logo. The URL ends in a multi-digit number, which corresponds to the specific image (see example at right). To retrieve the document again at a later date, type that URL from the printout into your browser's address bar. The image should load directly from the database, providing you are doing it at the library or at home with a personal subscription.

■ **Accessing library databases on laptops with WiFi capability:** The St. Louis County's database collection can be accessed via WiFi at any library location. With the web browser open on your laptop, go to the [library's database page](#) < <http://www.slcl.org/databases/>> and click on the link for the desired database (genealogy databases are listed under "History and Genealogy"). All databases can be accessed through WiFi at the library, including library-only databases such as *AncestryLibraryEdition* and *Footnote*. A library card is not necessary to log on to databases when using the library's wireless Internet access. Printing from laptops is not possible in the library, but images can be saved to a USB stick drive or other portable storage device. Sign up for a public computer and print out the images from there, or print them out at home.
