News from the Special Collections Department

DEPARTMENT TO ADD ADDITIONAL MICROFILM SCANNING STATIONS

Currently the Special Collections Department has one microfilm reader with the capability to scan images to a CD or flash drive. The Department is pleased to announce that it will add this feature to four other readers. Setup and preparation will take several months, but the staff hopes to have the four additional stations operational by this spring.

NORTHERN ILLINOIS SOCIETY DONATES COLLECTION OF PUBLISHED FAMILY HISTORIES

The Zion (Ill.) Genealogical Society has notified the St. Louis County Library that it will donate 54 published family histories to the Special Collections Department. The histories will be included in the circulating collection, making them available also for interlibrary loan. Zion is located north of Chicago near the Wisconsin border. After considering several other libraries for the donation, the Society determined that the Special Collections Department would be the most accessible location for the materials. The Department already holds more than 20,000 circulating items in the National Genealogical Society Book Loan Collection. Delivery of these books will be made at the end of November. A list of titles will be published in *PastPorts* once they are processed and cataloged.

Locale-specific German resources

Genealogical societies and publishers in Germany produce a number of locale-specific resources that are valuable for genealogical research. Of these, the *Ortssippenbücher* are perhaps the best known, but others include *Bürgerbücher*, *Häusergeschichten*, and *Hofgeschichten*. The Department has begun making direct contact with German publishers with the goal of acquiring as many of these high-quality materials as possible. With a few exceptions, many of these resources are so far unavailable in other U.S. libraries.

Locale-specific books for German genealogy can be a boon for the family history researcher. Not only do they offer an abundance of genealogical information, they also provide the geographical, cultural and historical context of ancestral origins. The books are in German, but genealogical information is usually presented in a standard format that requires little knowledge of the language. Historical and other information in the book is more of a challenge. Several staff members in the Department read German and can help patrons navigate the books.

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A brief description *Orstippenbücher*, *Bürgerbücher*, *Häusergeschichten*, and *Hofgeschichten* follows. A list of these held in the collection is available from the Special Collections Department. The Department is glad to receive suggestions for acquisitions. If you are looking for information in a specific town or village in Germany, email the information to scollections@slcl.org, and the Department will see if an *Ortssippenbuch* or other similar resource for that community can be purchased and placed in the collection.

ORTSSIPPENBÜCHER

Ortssippenbuch translates literally as “local kinship book,” from *Ort* meaning “place” or “locality,” and *Sippe* meaning “kin” or “clan.” They are also often referred to as *Ortsfamilienbücher* (local family books), *Einwohnerbücher* (“resident books”), or *Familienbücher* (“family books”). As the title indicates, *Ortssippenbücher* offer genealogical information about persons living in a specific locale. An *Ortssippenbuch* usually begins with general historical information about the locality followed by genealogical information about individual families. Lineages are often traced as far back as the 16th century using church books and civil registers as sources. Individuals are cross-referenced within the text, and books include name indexes. The Department has been collecting *Ortssippenbücher* from *Ostfriesland* (East Frisia) in the modern state of Lower Saxony for several years and is now extending its scope to include other areas of Germany.

BÜRGERBÜCHER

A *Bürgerbuch* lists the names of citizens (*Bürger*) in a specific town. Until the end of the 19th century, citizenship was dependent on owning property inside the town walls and was granted upon the payment of a fee. Early lists are usually just that—lists of names and nothing more. Later lists give a few more details, such as occupation and place of residence (citizens often actually lived elsewhere). These characteristics make *Bürgerbücher* a somewhat limited, but still valuable genealogical resource. They include name and place indexes.

HÄUSERGESCHICHTEN

A *Häusergeschichte* (from *Haus*, “house” or “dwelling” and *Geschichte*, “history”) is more than a history of houses. It lists the inhabitants who lived at specific addresses in a

specific town or village from as far back as the 16th century. A *Häusergeschichte* is usually introduced by a historical overview of the locality and often includes maps and photographs. Buildings are listed by address. Descriptions and historical data may be given for public buildings. Private dwellings may also be briefly described if such information exists. A chronological listing of the inhabitants follows, offering details of how and when the person obtained occupancy through purchase, lease, or inheritance.

HOFGESCHICHTEN

Hof can be translated as “farm” or “estate.” The occupants of a *Hof* were tenants who lived on the property and farmed the land. In exchange, the tenant owed the landlord a percentage of crops and an amount of personal labor each year. Leases were usually inheritable. As population grew, tenants often built cottages on their *Höfe* and leased them to families unable to obtain a *Hof* of their own. These *Kötter* (cottagers) and their families were allowed to live in the cottages and raise gardens for their own use in exchange for work on the farm. These practices, which began with medieval feudalism, persisted in most of Germany until the early-to-mid-19th century, when farmers were finally allowed to purchase their farms outright.

Like *Häusergeschichten*, *Hofgeschichten* usually begin with an historical overview of the farm village. They include information about the land owners—the nobles, or religious orders—who actually owned the various *Höfe*. Maps are included to show which landlord owned which parcels. Farmers usually lived in houses grouped together in small villages surrounded by the working fields. *Hofgeschichten* generally progress through the village house by house, listing the inhabitants of each *Hof*, and when each tenant gained tenancy through inheritance or marriage.

TIPS

■ How do you find a date when the exact date is not given in a document such as an old obituary. For example, in an obit printed in the April 1, 1883 *Westliche Post*, the only information offered is, “died suddenly on Friday at 2:30 a.m.” [The Time and Date.com website](http://www.thetimeanddate.com) lets users create a calendar for any year in the past or future. Using the site to create an 1883 calendar reveals that the death date in the

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example above was March 30, 1883. [URL: <http://www.timeanddate.com>]

■ **Life** magazine's photo archives includes millions of mostly unpublished photographs. Thanks to a joint project with Google, the magazine is digitizing the photos and publishing them in a searchable online database. Searching can be accomplished two ways: 1) through a [dedicated search page](#), and 2) using the regular [Google Image Search](#). In Image Search, add "source: life" (without quotes). WEB FINDS

■ **GNIS: USGS Geographic Names Information System**: This website from the U. S. Geological Survey allows users to locate not only populated places, but other features such as cemeteries, churches, mountains and rivers. All the specified features in one county or state can be displayed and include information about historic features no longer in existence. The site provides researchers with several mapping options, such as road maps and topographical maps, and give the latitude and longitude coordinates. ■ **U.S. Home Town Locator**: Based on the same data as the GNIS website described above, this electronic gazetteer enables you to identify the county where a town or village is located. The database can be searched by town and state or zip code, and the results include a Google map showing the location. States and counties can be browsed. The "Physical, Cultural and Historic Features" link for each county includes information about the location of historical or extinct towns. [URL: <http://www.hometownlocator.com>]

■ **Chronicling America: Historic American Newspapers**: This free website from the Library of Congress (LOC) offers searchable digitized newspapers, 1880-1910. Although the offerings are limited and cover only a few states, the LOC plans to expand the site into a significant source for digitized historical newspapers. ■ **St. Peter's Cemetery**: The website for this 150-year-old St. Louis cemetery allows researchers to do an online burial search. The site also includes historical information and a description of the records available from the cemetery office. [URL: <http://www.stpeterschurch.org/cemetery/index.htm>]

NEW ON ANCESTRY

Ancestry Library Edition is available at all St. Louis County Library locations.

Ancestry Library Edition adds new databases daily. To find out what databases have been added recently, go to the Ancestry Library Edition home page and scroll to the bottom of the page. Under "More Collections," click on the "Recent" link.

■ **Jewish Family History Collection**: The result of a partnership between *Ancestry*, JewishGen and the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC), this free database collection includes nearly 26 million records. Databases include vital records, directories and census records from Hungary, Latvia, Poland and many other Eastern European countries.

■ **U.S. Army Indian Campaign Service Records Index, 1815-1858**: This database includes records of soldiers who served during the Cherokee disturbances and removal, 1836-1839, often referred to in the records as the Cherokee War. Records include those who belonged to units from Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina, and Tennessee, and volunteer field and staff of the Army of the Cherokee Nation. The database also includes those who served in various Indian wars or participated in quelling Indian disturbances, 1815-1858. The database includes images of the original documents. It is not searchable by name, but can be browsed.

■ **U.S. Marine Corps Muster Rolls, 1798-1940**: This database contains an index and images of the U.S. Marine Corps muster rolls from 1798-1940. Information included in this database includes: name, rank, enlistment date, muster date, and station.

■ **U.S. Navy Pensions Index, 1861-1910**: An index to Navy pensions. This database is searchable but does not include document images.
